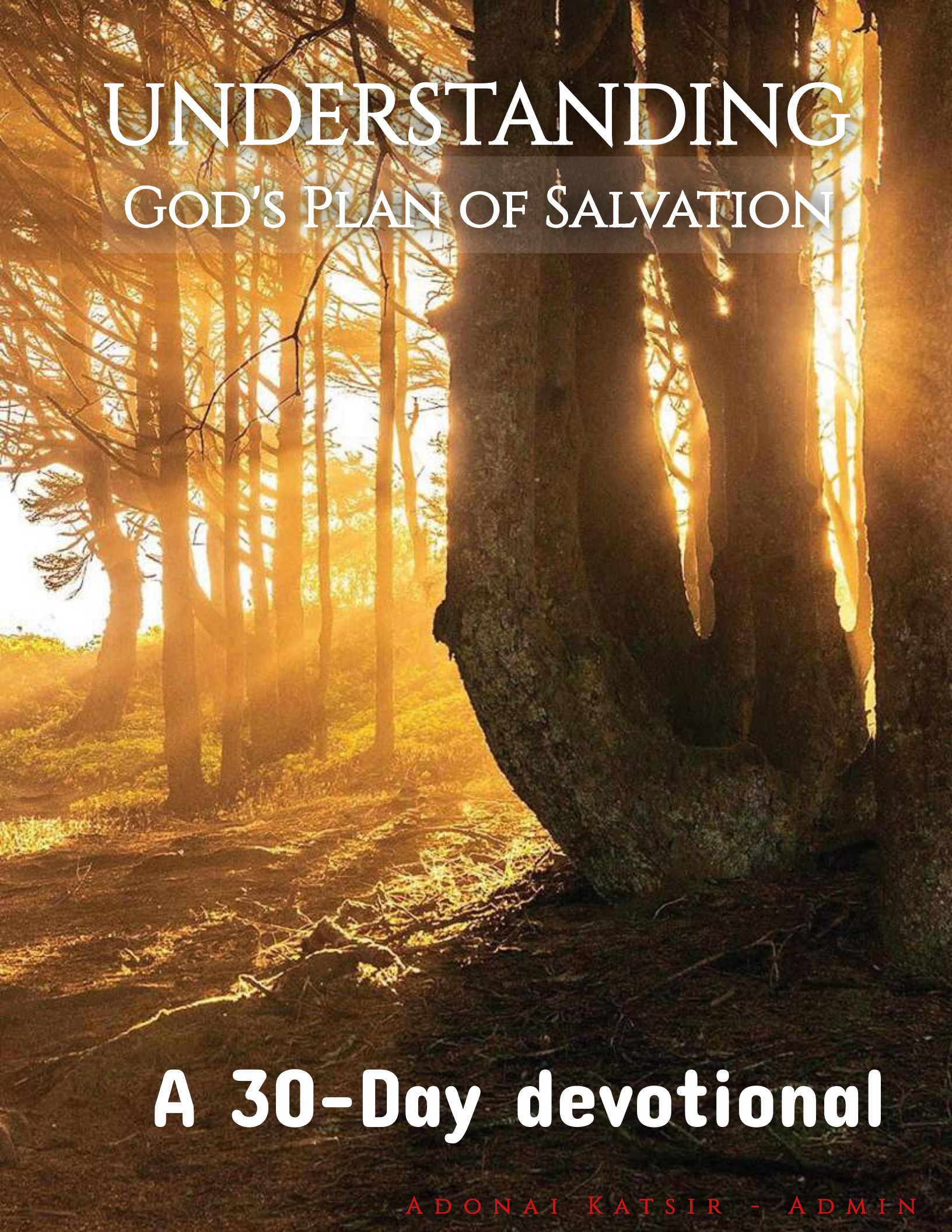

REFLECTION – THE FIRST PULSE

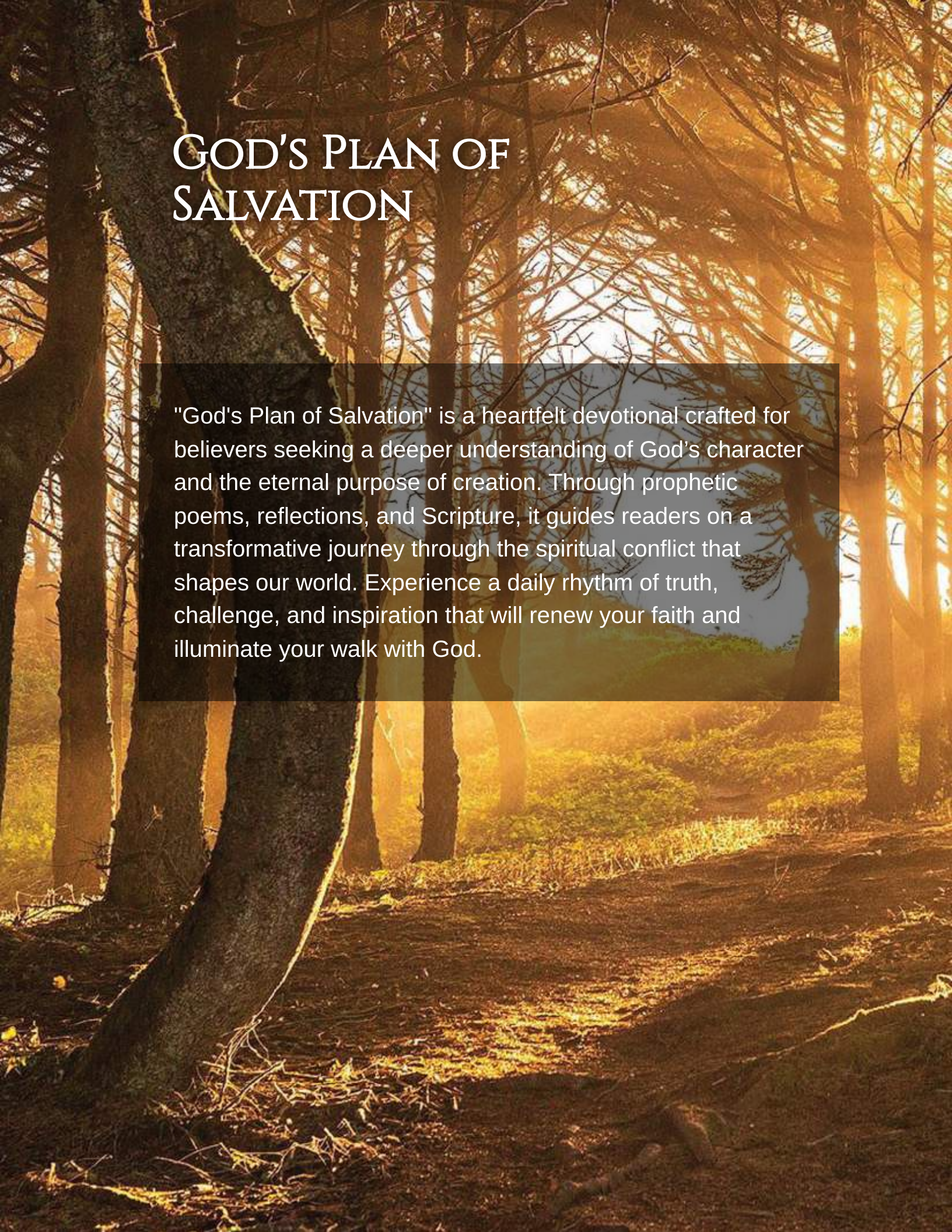
